PARISH NEWS... Parish News previously reported that the Parish Council had

been in contact with the Highways Division concerning a request that the speed limit on Buckden Road past the village boundary be reduced from 60mph to 50mph. A letter from Highways indicates that this is highly unlikely to occur and certainly not before 2011. This will be disappointing to those people living on the affected stretch of road. However, the hazards can be avoided if the 60mph limit is observed. Almost everyone in the village is concerned about the speed of through traffic, but the potential for tragedy is just as great on the roads out of the village.

As part of the Council's focus on through traffic, there has been some correspondence with the District Council concerning the shape of the junction at Brampton and Buckden Roads. Several people have said that vehicles sweeping round this junction from Breach Road come quite fast and very close to the footpath. This can be quite scary if you are waiting to cross the road and the vehicle is large. The junction should have been reshaped thus forcing traffic to slow down considerably in order to get round it and this reshaping was a condition of a past planning application. It obviously did not happen and is now being followed up by the District Council. We hope to have further information in time for the next PC meeting.

A member of the SAS (Save All Saints) group spoke to the PC at its last meeting to seek support for its aims and practical aid where possible. The Council is fully supportive of the aims of the group and has agreed to give full consideration to all requests for help.

A further £350 has been received from the District Council for the recycling bins. Please keep using them, they are providing much needed funds for the village hall. *Margaret Life,* Clerk to the PC



Buckden Surgery Patients We welcome a new nurse Viv Willox and hope she will very much enjoy being a part of the Buckden surgery team. Viv Association (BSPA) began work on 22nd October; she is an experienced nurse but is new to General Practice and will be working alongside

the other nurses for the next few months.

Buckden surgery has been redecorated, new lighting installed and a new carpet laid. As widely advertised, we held an evening of Presentations on 10th October, to give advice and information about equipment available to enable people to remain at home safely and independently and techniques to minimize the risk of falling. There was also a talk on



Acupuncture and another about the Hospice at Home for those needing palliative care. It was an extremely informative evening, filled with practical advice and with demonstrations of an amazing range of aids to use in the home, from the simple to the very sophisticated. It was a most enjoyable and successful event and my only regret was that more people were not able to benefit from it!

Patients who were unable to attend the flu jab session on Saturday 13th October are encouraged to make an alternative appointment with the Practice Nurse.

On the broader scale, problems in our PCT continue to have a significant and worrying impact at surgery level, specifically the District Nursing Service is in crisis at the moment. The District Nurses are employed by the PCT and not the Surgery but have a significant impact on the running of the practice. Two nurses have been lost in the past 18 months and it has not been possible to replace them, and this has imposed an unacceptable burden on the remaining staff. At the request of the PCT, the District Nurses conducted an in-depth, time consuming audit to validate the need for replacements but to date no funding has been made available despite urgent representations made by Dr Irwin. We have heard more favorable responses from the PCT but we wait to see the promised nurses in post first.

This problem has to be set in the wider context of the Government's determination to discharge hospital patients very much sooner while still needing a high level of medical and nursing support. Additionally, Hinchingbrooke are wanting to off-load many more services from the hospital without ensuring local surgeries have the capacity to fulfil these additional obligations. There is a complete lack of clarity and cohesion about the way in which the Government's aspirations are to be achieved.

My concern remains the practical problems surrounding the delivery of safe and comprehensive care in the community without first addressing the issues of staff and funding levels, especially in an area that has a District General Hospital that wants - or is forced - to become more community based.

Blood tests for those on Wafarin are to move into the community from Hinchingbrooke soon. New clinics being established for people from the Buckden and Little Paxton surgeries will be at the Cedar House and Dumbelton Medical Centre in St Neots (near Tesco).

Having three years ago conducted lengthy negotiations with GPs representatives prior to issuing the new contracts, the Government has now decided it has misjudged the amount of work GPs did above and beyond their obligations and also misjudged cost that would ensue as a result of GPs opting-out of evening and weekend work. So we have yet another 'initiative' to impose changes to GPs surgery hours with the Government wanting them to open in the evenings and weekends with the threat that those practices refusing to comply will receive a smaller slice of NHS funding. This appears to me to be insulting to hard-working overstretched doctors who are already facing increasing financial overheads and commitments with no commensurate funding. GPs have had no increase in their funding for the past 2 years despite inflation and there is no indication as to where money is to come from to cover staff support during the proposed extended hours. What does the NHS do with its budget, why does it constantly feel the overwhelming need to interfere and de-motivate staff?

The First Christmas Card

This image is of the world's first commercial Christmas card. It was commissioned by Henry Cole in 1843, the same year Charles Dickens wrote A Christmas Carol.

Henry Cole was a lifelong civil servant with a great interest in art and design. He worked under Rowland Hill between 1837 and 1840 as they worked to introduce the universal Penny Postage and the first postage stamp, the Penny Black. Cole later played a key role in organising the Great Exhibition of 1851.

1,000 of these Christmas cards were printed, and Cole used as many as he required before selling the rest for 6d (sixpence) each. This price made them a luxury item, unavailable to the working class. The card was designed by John C Horsley.
