# Buckden Surgery Patients Association (BSPA)

The Christmas raffle in aid of MAGPAS raised £545. Thank you to everyone who generously donated prizes and bought tickets.

The response to my request for books to sell in aid of BSPA funds was fantastic! We now have a wide range of books and are extremely grateful to Shirley Wimbleton for running this scheme.

Doctors Leonard and Blundy are now enjoying the 'luxury' of their own consulting rooms!

There was a generally high level of patient satisfaction with our surgery services according to the November survey. However, the delays sometimes experienced whilst waiting to see the doctor remain a problem. This is quite difficult to resolve as consultation times are not an exact science, complex problems may require longer than ten minutes. The doctors remain committed to keeping as closely as possible to the appointment times but please remember that if you have more than one problem to discuss, do book a double appointment in order to minimise delays to other patients.

The fight to retain all services at Hinchingbrooke Hospital continues and there are some positive signs for the retention of A and E which has ramifications for other services. If A and E closed there would be a significant reduction in surgical and medical admissions. Then the authorities could try to justify further ward closures on the grounds of insufficient use. It is therefore essential to continue the campaign to keep full A and E services. Less clear is what might happen to obstetric services and the retention of that service must be fiercely defended as well. We continue to hear much about Care in the Community and the desirability of discharging patients quickly, even after major surgery. Whilst this may sound attractive, it neatly sidesteps the question of who will do the caring once patients are home. Quite where all the skilled professionals, community nurses and carers capable of working independently and confidently with high-dependency patients are to be found, remains a serious question. Additionally, early discharges will involve our GPs in a substantial level of post-operative supervision. This significant increase in workload must impact on their routine patients' needs. This problem will be compounded should the forecast shortage of GP nurses become a reality. My concern is that much will be expected of family and friends who, however willing, may not have the necessary expertise.

**Finally, a plea to Grafham residents**. There are some 800 Grafham patients registered with the practice. Is there someone prepared to act as a village representative on our Committee? We have four meetings a year and welcome enthusiasm and ideas. Anyone interested should contact our secretary, Betty Millard on 810087.
