

The pathway between Breach Road and Field Close/Alsyke Close has become very weedy and untidy. The council has decided to find out the cost of replanting the verge along this pathway with either grass or wild flowers.

Further information is coming to light about the plans for the chicken farm. The new owners have a five-year lease and are planning to cut the numbers of chickens housed by up to 30%, grow them over a longer period and allow them more freedom. The council hopes that, if this is the case, the environment there will be much cleaner and healthier for all concerned.

The compost giveaway proved popular and all the compost received was taken by residents.

The all-weather sports facility came a step closer this month with the completion of the purchase of the playing field. As a condition of the purchase, the land can only be used as a recreation facility for

Grafham village for a period of 80 years.

May has been a good month for Grafham Cricket Club; all 4 games played in this month had been won leaving Grafham

top of Bedford League Division 2. To every upside there is a downside and June is not such a good month, as the two games played so far have been heavily lost.

The first game in June was against GGSG 1: played at Mowsbury Park Bedford on a pitch that resembled tapioca pudding, caused by heavy overnight rain. Nevertheless GGSG 1 amassed a score of 259 for 7 off 32 overs. Jack Sene and Tom Chester took two wickets a piece, but all the bowling figures made uncomfortable reading from a Grafham perspective. It was decided at the tea time talk that Grafham

could not make the runs, so we would go for batting points and deny GGSG bowling points. This Grafham did by cautiously batting to 78 for 5 off the allotted 32 overs, with Chris Brown scoring 27, ably supported by Jack Sene 16 and Adi Love not out 16. After this match Grafham were still top of the league.

The next game was against Lidlington; away. Early tight bowling by Adam Dighton and Ben Dickson kept Lidlington's openers tied down with Adam finishing on 27 for 2 off 10 overs. Lidlington gradually accelerated their scoring and finished with 222 for 8, with their score being built around their batsman number 4 Ian Temple who scored 104 not out. There was to be no repeat of last weeks' tactic of batting for points. The highlight of the Grafham innings was Colin Grundy's 29, who hit a massive 6 into the adjoining field. The other innings of note was Tom Clayton's 11, batted over a long period with the intention of delaying the inevitable, but in the end Grafham were all out for 86 off 29 overs.

The next home game in July is against Lidlington so perhaps July will be another May for Grafham.

Letters to the Editors... I have NO objections to the poultry farm

I note with interest the recent news in the June edition of the *Grafham Gossip* that you have finally hounded this local business into submission. I would like to point out that I have lived in Field Close for four years and have NEVER had issues with the so called sickening smell (apparently one villager was physically sick as reported in previous editions) and it has never been an eyesore in all the times I have passed it on my bike so please do not publish items in this manner as if they are the opinion of all as they most certainly are not.

As with all these things, such as the humps/thrumps fiasco, ill informed and ill advised people make decisions based on their own self serving interests.

The noise pollution from the thrumps FAR outweighed any that were supposedly from the farm. NONE of which I could confirm as again I have NEVER had any noise pollution issues regarding the poultry farm. Bizarrely enough poultry farms are common in rural areas so I would suggest those that find them so offensive might consider relocation to a more suburban area.

The reality is now this area will eventually be turned into more cottages as you quite clearly know, which in turn will lead to more traffic along a well used cycle route. Where exactly will you stand on the noise pollution issue then? The problem with local rags such as yours continuing a vendetta against the poultry farm is that the alternatives are quite often less palatable but at this stage it is to late to leave well alone.

What's there at the moment is not a farm. It's a factory.

I would like to reply to a letter from Teresa Hollands. It was printed in last month's "Letter to the Editors." In her letter, Ms. Hollands raised some interesting points regarding the application for planning permission on the site where the chicken farm now stands. I would like to respond to the points she raised. 1. Development of agricultural land Let's be honest, we all know what a farm looks like. What's there at the moment is not a farm. It's a factory. The site resembles a small industrial unit. It's not been agricultural land for more than twenty years.

2. More traffic and a change to the rural aspect I think there are more big lorries visiting the chicken factory at all hours of the day and night and driving through Grafham now, than there would be if the site had holiday homes on it. If the chicken factory were to close there would be no more lorries. The four big sheds that currently house the chickens can hardly be called "picturesque". A landscaped estate with lodges set amongest trees would enhance the rural aspect. It would look so much nicer. 3. Impact on domestic amenities. At the moment, the chicken factory has no impact upon domestic amenities, with no benefits at all to Grafham. Build ten more holiday homes, there will be more tourists. The little shop on Church Road may re-open. There would be more customers for all local businesses. It would have a positive impact upon domestic amenities. 4. Water resources The chicken factory uses a lot of water. I mean a lot! Demand for water would decrease if there were holiday homes there.

That's a good thing, right? **5. Vermin relocation** This wouldn't be the first chicken factory to close down. Other villages have found solutions to the problems rats cause when their food supply is removed. There must be specialist out there to help deal with this. We'll soon find someone, it's definitely not a problem. The problem is not closing the chicken factory, it's keeping it. There's been prob-

lems with it for years. The smell can be unbearable. There are days when the stench is so bad it makes people ill. That's not an exaggeration. I know of one chap who is regularly forced to leave his place of work because he's been made to feel so sick. I know of three other people who have moved away to escape that stuff that floats in the air when they're cleaning out. I think it's a mixture of feathers, droppings and dead birds. It's not healthy whatever it is. So ten holiday homes on the site, would seem to me to be a much better idea. Who would, or could disagree with me? Then there's the noise from lorries and the fork lift truck during the night. You can forget about sleep. It usually starts about 11pm and continues till the early hours. Do farms make noises like that? Or factories? Or better still, holiday homes? I don't know of too many holiday parks who regularly have lorries and fork lift trucks on site, continously revving their engines all through the night. Do you? So my two wishes are 1- for the chicken factory to close down, 2 - planning permission by given to build a holiday park there.


