NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

CAUSE FOR CONCERN Sept 2010

Four incidents in the village in the month - is this just the beginning?

On Sunday morning 5th September, a group of Irish builders were trying to get business by paving driveways. The police have been called in to investigate this matter. Their advice is, under no circumstances accept a quote to do work in this manner from an unknown builder and to call the Police Control Centre without delay.

On Sunday 12th September a black Renault was seen driving around the village with two young males - one black and one, white checking out properties - when a resident went to speak to them the car took off at speed and the registration number could not be obtained.

Residents living in Inhams Way returned from holiday on 15th September at 12.24pm to discover their house had been burgled since they departed on 10th September at 2pm - this crime is being investigated.

The resident that wrote a letter in this magazine about their honesty box being stolen has now reported the incident to the police and it is being treated as a crime.

In neighbouring **Brampton**, there have been two burglaries: On September 4th between 7pm and 10pm a busi-



ness was broken into in the High Street and on 14th September between 6.30am and 11pm an unknown offender/s broke into a private property in Chestnut Close.

For the seventh month running I am appealing for residents to agree to display a Neighbourhood Watch sticker - I estimate that at least 85 properties don't have one, and it is not helping to highlight the scheme. Thank you to those people that contacted me last month - 5 of you! I will not be making any further requests - it is now up to each and every resident if they choose to support the scheme but I would urge you all to re-consider displaying a sticker. Looking ahead to **November**, our Patronal Festival of All Saints occurs on **Monday 1st**. We are invited to share the celebration with Ellington at a Group Eucharist on **31 October at 9.30am**. **On 14th November the Remembrance Sunday Service** will begin at 10.55 am with the short Act of Remembrance at 11 am.

During the summer it has been a pleasure to welcome so many visitors to the church, either to services or just passing by on their walk or cycle ride, calling in to look round or just browsing our bookshelves or plant stall. They are almost unanimous in their admiration of our much loved church which they regard as so clearly loved and cared for.



PARISH NEWS...



September 2010

The Parish Council has had planning permission granted for the erection of a village sign. An order for the work to be carried out will now be placed and it is hoped to have the sign in place before the end of the year.

The Parish Plan is to be revised, updated and re-issued. This will happen by consultation with Grafham residents via a questionnaire delivered to every household and by gathering ideas and opinions from those attending the public meeting at the village hall. Details about this meeting have been issued to every home in the village. The Parish Council has undertaken to give full support to the requirements as laid out in a revised plan and to meet all reasonable production costs for the project as funding from the District Council is not available this time round.

It was agreed to order top-up supplies of grit or salt for the bins, but that no further bins will be required.

It was agreed to purchase a further supply of spring bulbs for planting around the village.

Parish Councillors attended the AGM of the Grafham Community Allotment Gardening Association. There is a slight chance that a small piece of land (approximately 1 acre) could be made available for renting from the church. This is located to the west of the village at the back of the church. Currently unused and not suitable for farming, this plot offers the potential to satisfy the allotment needs of Grafham residents, subject to making arrangements for access. The GCAGA are keen to adopt this land and the Parish Clerk will be speaking with Ely Diocese on these issues.

The Parish Council (PC) has received a large amount of documentation concerning the proposals for wind farms in the area. As a planning issue for the PC, its responses are restricted to planning issues. A planning application consultation document has been received in respect of the proposal for turbines at Kimbolton and a Scoping Opinion document has been received concerning the erection of turbines at Perry. The Parish Council is restricted to making representation as a Parish Council and not as individuals. Any matters raised must be material planning matters. As such the PC has replied on the planning application to the effect that it has no observations either in favour or against the proposal. The Parish Council will attend the public exhibition concerning the Perry Wind Farm proposals, due to be held at the Wheatsheaf in Perry on 27th September.

There is still a vacancy on the Parish Council. If you would like to join the PC please contact the clerk by phone, email or by post Contact details are shown below.

The date of the next meeting of the Parish Council is Tuesday 12th October, 2010.

Letter to the Editors...

Dusts and Dursts

Following last month's letter when Ruari asked if anyone know of records or information of his ancestors, he writes about his recent visit to Grafham...

My cousin, David Durst, and I had a lovely visit to Grafham. What a beautiful church - our favourite of the day; we were in SEVEN that day!

What a delight! The north aisle of the church dates from 1250, which suggests that the nave, dating from about 1300, replaced an earlier building. The south chapel was added in the 1300s. The tower and spire were built about 1400. By 1748 the "whole church was very bad and nasty." Dormer windows were added to the roof, when it became fashionable to raise the nave walls and add clerestory windows. Several original tie beams survive and still hold the church together. The church has been saved and sympathetically restored without losing anything of its medieval charm.

It was in Grafham that the Dust family reappeared. John Dust (V) came to Grafham in the early 1700s. His father William had been a "clayer" or maker of bricks, and John Dust and his brother Thomas were both bricklayers. A clayer might be a mast brick maker, but the term bricklayer suggests something less exalted.

I called the church warden, Hazel, who told me that she had seen my letter in the *Grafham Gossip*, but there was no record of any stones in the graveyard bearing the Dust or Durst name. It did not stop David Durst and me from searching, as another source had told us that he had found a foot stone with the initials I.D. and the date 1781.

I.D. could have been John Durst, but the date was too early for either John Durst (V) or John Durst (VI) who was probably buried at Buckden.

Even so, with the beautiful, unspoiled church - celebrating a flower festival with delightful displays in the church - and its ancient font, we both felt close to our ancestors.

A Shepherd's Tale - 24

It has been an exciting month with visits to sheep sales, acquisitions and some despatches to the butcher. The net result is too many sheep. The first market I visited was at Thrapston, where as an experiment, I took one shearing ram to see how the market worked. There was a lot of waiting around and my ram was the penultimate one under the hammer, unfortunately he failed to meet my very modest reserve so I brought him home. I was not totally disappointed. I am planning to "sponge" my ewes (I will explain next month) and therefore need a higher ram to ewe ratio so he can help with the tugging.

A week later my new ram East Dean "Dean" arrived. He comes from one of the largest and most well known Southdown flocks. He was ranked by the performance recording scheme

as the second best ram of his year. The best was his twin brother who was retained by his breeder. He is a lot bigger in the frame than Furlong and weighed almost exactly the same but he still he has a lot of growing to do.

My plan was to grow the flock to about 25 ewes this year, and 35 next year but things have gone awry. The show



and sale catalogue for a Southdown sale at Worcester highlighted three good quality ewes that I was interested in, I also knew a breeder who was driving past and would give any purchases a free lift back to Grafham. A dawn run got me there in time to watch the judging; when it came to the sale I realised that the prices for what I thought were average ewes were too high and therefore I suspected my target ewes would be too expensive. Fearing that I would miss out on these, I bought two nice ewes from another flock and then waited. Of course the ewes I was really after were not as expensive as I feared so I bought two of these. Then as we were leaving the sale I was approached by the breeder of my third target ewe: "Would I buy it at the reserve price?" so I said yes; the worst bit was there were some other ewes I was still interested in the Melton Mowbray sale the following week. Prices at Melton were in the main slightly lower and I got the ewes I was after. As I was well below budget I indulged myself by buying a ewe lamb that was Breed Champion; she has since been christened by Michael as "Fluffy".



Although I have over indulged this year, I hope my "ewe buying" days are over. The flock is large enough at 30 ewes to breed its own replacements and grow; it also means I can "close" the flock which will reduce the risk of bringing in diseases from other flocks and purchases such as rams will be quarantined on arrival.

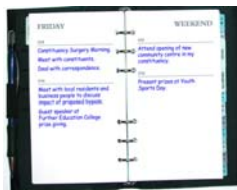

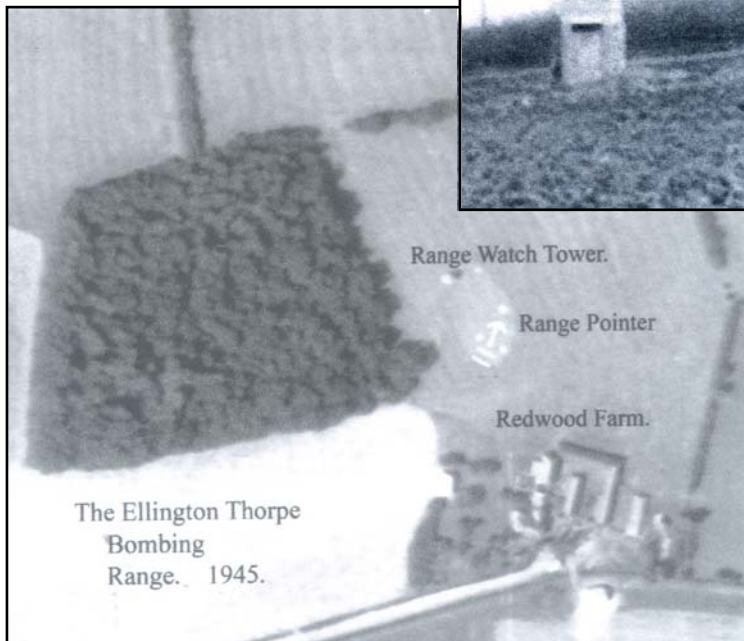
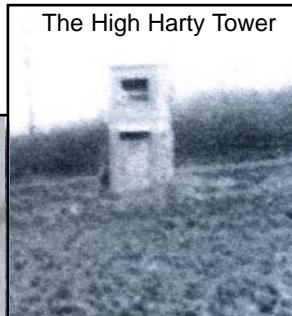


The Ellington Thorpe Military Bombing Range

During the Second World War a bombing range was constructed in the fields of Ellington Thorpe, used mainly by the American Air Force. Two Watch Towers were built one at Redwood Lodge Farm which was demolished in the early 1960s and the other at High Harty Farm which still stands. These were manned by American personnel throughout the war to monitor the bombing. An arrow marker at Redwood pointed to the bombing area near the watch tower as shown in the photograph. Sand filled practice bombs were used and sometimes fell close to Ellington village. The field where the bombs fell is now called "Bomb Dump."

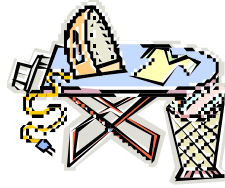

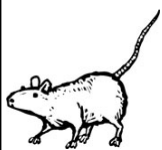
