# CHURCH RESTORATION

A message from Grafham Parish Church Council (PCC)

Last year the Parish Questionnaire revealed that most people in the village would like the church to remain. A village church is a valuable asset to a small community, not only for the religious services it provides, although that is a very important function. It is generally well known that the presence of a church in a village adds greatly to its appeal and is a focus for village life.





How would you feel if there was no longer a church in the village? Would you miss that ancient building as you walk through the churchyard on a sunny summer afternoon or winter morning? Would you miss the sound of

the bells on Sunday or for someone's wedding? Would you like to think the church is here for you when you need a quiet place to reflect or pray, a baptism, wedding or funeral, a place to celebrate Easter or Christmas, even just to come and look at the festive flowers on those occasions?

Our church is approximately 800 years old and is a Grade 1 listed building. It is now in need of urgent repairs. Apart from cracks in the arches, which are currently being monitored under the supervision of a specialist engineer, repairs are needed to the roof, gutters and downpipes, drainage and masonry.

Our church architect has identified the areas of immediate concern and the first stage of repairs will cost in the region of  $\pounds$ 35,000; the full restoration of the church is currently estimated to cost in the region of  $\pounds$ 170,000. However, there is a risk that once work begins more deterioration will be discovered.

Grafham All Saints In view of Father Jonathan Young's

current sick leave, services will be as follows for the next few weeks:-

**26th February** (4th Sunday)

11.00 Ellington Eucharist No service at Grafham 4th March (1st Sunday) 11.00 Grafham



Contrary to popular belief, the church is not rich. The only money a church receives is in the weekly collections at services, fees for weddings etc. and fund-raising events such as summer and Christmas fêtes. Out of this money we have to pay an annual contribution towards the cost of a full time priest for the five parishes in our Group amounting to approximately £4,000, as well as covering the usual running costs of the building, electricity, insurance, etc.

To help raise money for the restoration and upkeep of the church building, Save All Saints was established in October

2007 and to date, with the help of the village, over  $\pounds12,000$  has been raised. Perhaps just as important the fund raising events, from Burn's nights to a quilt exhibition, have added to the community life in the village.



Some £6,660 has been used to pay for: a full report detailing the condition of the church; investigation into structural cracks and preliminary holding repairs to the spire and roof.

We are in the process of preparing applications for grant funding for the restoration of the church. However, the amount of any grant will depend upon our need and also the commitment that the community has made to raising funds.

You have been very generous with your support so far at church and Save All Saints events. To help ensure the preservation of our church however we need to ask you for a "one-off" donation of any amount you can afford, to help us fulfill the requirements of the grant funding application.

We will therefore be writing to everyone in the village to appeal for help. We hope and trust you will take this matter to heart, not only for the church's sake but for the sake of future generations of villagers who will be grateful the church has been saved.

# PARISH NEWS...

#### January 2012

On 31st January, the Parish Council hosted

a meeting of councillors from other local areas and representatives from the District Council to discuss the future of community transport. Three Grafham residents also attended the meeting. There was a lot of discussion



concerning the existing services, what cuts were to be made and how the communities might best be served by community transport. It was clear that people would want a regular service,

rather than an "on-demand" bus and that a service was likely to be most useful when going to St Neots and the train station; the suggested route being Grafham- Perry -Gt. Staughton - Hail Weston – St. Neots and return. There was also the suggestion that the prison visitor bus could be put to use at weekends, instead of just waiting several hours to return visitors to Huntingdon Station. There has been no feedback to date on the ideas put forward, but Peter Downes is hoping for a further meeting to discuss outcomes in more detail. Information leaflets from Nene and Ouse Community Transport are available, but the question is – how best to get this information to those who might need it.

Cambridgeshire County Council is apparently pushing ahead with the plan to provide the whole of Cambridgeshire with superfast broadband connection by 2015. However, if you can't wait that long, there are alternatives, details of which can be found on the village website or by contacting our broadband champion, Chris Bulow on <u>chris.bulow@gmail.com</u>

The Parish Plan summary is almost ready for delivery. The PC have reviewed the plan and approved it. A copy of the plan will be delivered to every household in the village.

The village hall refurbishment plan is pushing ahead and

we hope to be able to take advantage of a charitable distribution of equipment and furniture, possibly in March.

A Parish Council representative will be meeting with members of Save All Saints and the Social Committee to discuss early



arrangements for celebrating the Diamond Jubilee. If you haven't done so already, you can let the PC know your opinions and preferences by completing a short survey which you can find on the village website. Alternatively you can just call someone from one of these groups and tell them what you think (in the nicest possible way please!)

Information was put to the Parish Council about the fea-



sibility of providing Grafham with a Community Shop. Various funding streams from the District Council, Awards for All and the sale of redeemable shares to residents can be made available to help with the set-

up. There will have to be some discussion over the siting of a shop and it will be necessary to form a committee to manage the set-up and apply for funding. This committee would need to include professional skills such as accountancy, retail experience, legal and project management etc. There would also be a requirement for a band of volunteers to staff the shop. If you are interested in taking any part in this project or have any questions about it please e-mail

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

Between January 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> overnight, a theft occurred from a barn backing onto Church Road and two bales of sawdust horse bedding was stolen. The crime is being investigated.



Last month I published a warning from the police about metal theft, but what happened on the evening of January  $30^{th}$  between 7.30pm and midnight is staggering. A resident living in Haycraft Close had the catalytic converter sawn off from the rear of their vehicle. The scrap value of this would be £40 but the person in question has been quoted £1200 to have it replaced.

Everyone will recall the letter in the last issue of the *Grafham Gossip* whereby a resident had their vehicle stolen from their drive. This seems to be a widespread problem as highlighted by Crimestoppers. *(See article below.)* 

Anyone can check crime related matters through the website: <u>www.ourwatch.org.uk</u> your local area and type in your post code.

#### **IMPORTANT – THE NEW NUMBER – 101**

Cambridgeshire Police have launched a new number providing people with a new way to get in touch about nonemergency issues.

# 101 is now the main number to call Cambridgeshire Police when it is less urgent than 999

As well as making the police more accessible to communities, it is intended that 101 will reduce the number of inappropriate 999 calls. There will be a single flat rate charge of 15p per call, regardless of the duration, time of day, mobile or landline.

YOU SHOULD CALL 101 to report crime and other concerns that do not require an emergency response.

For example:

Stolen Cars / if you suspect drug dealing or taking / to speak to our Local Policing Team.

In an emergency, always call 999 when you need an immediate response.

For example:

When a crime is in progress / someone suspected of a crime is nearby / when there is a danger to life / when violence is being used or threatened

#### 101 will not:

Change the way in which we respond to non-emergency calls / connect people to a large national call centre / result in calls receiving a lower priority than if 999 had been used for non emergency use.

#### 101 should not be used to report:

Fly tipping / noise pollution / stray dogs

These should be initially reported to Huntingdon Council.

#### CRIMESTOPPERS

I have been advised that a new policing structure is being put into place by Cambridgeshire Constabulary and Alan Mackender Lawrence, who supported Grafham for many years, will be representing us with Crimestoppers in the hope that we can get more information from their sources. On the weekend of 3rd February in Huntingdon, an Xregistered Silver Vauxhall Astra was stolen from Mayfield

registered Silver Vauxhall Astra was stolen from Mayfield Crescent and index plates from an Audi A4 in Norfolk Road and also from a Ford Kia in Deal Close. If anyone has any information please call the police on 101.

During December,10 detections and a further 6 persons received convictions from information supplied to Crimestoppers making a total of 112 detections and 78 convictions since last April.

75 new leads have been received last month.

A rogue trader is operating through the area by the name of Gary Howard targeting the elderly and vulnerable for unnecessary house maintenance and grossly overcharging them for the work. This male has a team of 6 associates working with him.

# **Burglary Warning**

There have been no further burglaries in the village following the break-in at Cedar Close in January. Residents are asked to continue to remain vigilant and consider some of the following precautions:

- Alarms: Install an alarm even an empty box on the side of your home can be enough to put off a burglar. Burglars hate alarms as it cuts down the amount of time they have in a house to conduct a search and time is gold dust.
- Dogs: Burglars do not like being bitten and they hate dogs barking. A `beware of the dog' sign can be enough to put off an intruder, regardless of whether a dog is present.



Creating a safer Cambridgeshire

- Lock up your shed: Offenders do not like carrying break-in tools as they may be searched en-route to a burglary. They often raid sheds to get their hands on tools to burgle. Burglars also like to store stolen goods and return for them later so they are not caught with items just after a break-in.
- Strong communities are also a deterrent for burglars: Make friends with your neighbours or join your local Neighbourhood Watch scheme. Report any suspicious activity to the police.

Investigations into the Cedar Close burglary continue and anyone with information about the offence is asked to contact the police on 101.




# The House by the Footbridge in Ellington Thorpe

#### Super-fast broadband

Having read with great interest the letter from Chris Bulow in February's Grahams Gossip" (sic) regarding the possibility of higher-speed broadband in the village I immediately visited the NextGenUs website for more information. Following a recent upgrade to the BT Exchange in Buckden my BT Broadband nominal speed has been increased from 1.2Mbps to 1.6Mbps but it's still not fast enough to watch streamed film or TV so an alternative solution could be attractive.

Unfortunately, the pricing model of the NextGenUs solution means it is out of the question as far as I am concerned. £19.95 per month for 10Mbps is just about acceptable but the 10GB monthly cap precludes streaming; the next price step removes that limit but, at £29.95 per month, is twice what I currently pay BT for broadband and all my calls.

So, I am sorry, Chris; I wish you good luck and hope you'll receive the support you need from other residents but, as they say, include me out on this one. I shall have to wait for BT to eventually provide the performance within my existing contract. *A Grafham Resident* 

# The Wyvern



Residents of The Wyvern wish to make villagers aware that the land and hedgerow opposite each house up to the farmland border belongs to each individual house owner and is therefore not common land. They would ask individuals and particularly dog owners to respect this and not take short cuts across the grass into the field. Care Network Cambridgeshire Information and Help information on how to keep warm in your home, practical help with such things as shopping and collecting medication in bad weather plus information and advice on other organisations who may be able to help (For any vulnerable adult) Also talks to groups about the Warm Homes Healthy People project and how to access the support available

Age UK Cambridgeshire Energy Efficiency – a free energy assessment, free installation of practical energy efficiency measures and an information pack (For people aged 60 or over)

Age UK Cambridgeshire Shopping Project - help by a trained advisor to place on line orders for groceries (For vulnerable people aged 60 or over)

Age UK Cambridgeshire Winter Information - information on how to keep warm in your home, other winter measures and advice on other organisations who may be able to help you (For people aged 60 or over)

Arthur Rank Hospice – grants to meet fuel bills, obtain warmer clothing, and delivered hot meals for those suffering with a life limiting illness. Other discretionary grants may also be available where a clinician has identified a need.

Citizen's Advice Bureau - advice tailored to individual circumstances on benefit entitlement, grants, money advice and best energy deals

Children's Centres - sessions on cooking warm healthy meals for families with young children

Cambridgeshire Community Foundation - funding support for groups offering support to homeless people or those with mental health issues in order to boost their capacity to respond during cold weather

#### People can also be referred to ...

Huntingdonshire District Council - vulnerable households affected by cold homes may be able to access emergency measures through a crisis fund which can provide loft and cavity wall insulation, carbon monoxide monitors and 'warmometers'.



# A Shepherd's Tale February 2012

It seems ages since I wrote anything about the sheep. Family issues and the fact that the shepherd's calendar is repetitious means that I was not sure I had anything news worthy to say! Anyway as I write this we are on the cusp of lambing. We have come a long way in the last five years: I am amazed that this is my fifth lambing at Grafham and how the flock has grown from 3 to 42 ewes. We also have a number of "followers": rams, ram lambs and replacement ewes which bring the total head count to 72.

So what's been happening, when I last wrote tupping was in full swing and I am pleased to say the rams have done a good job. Every ewe was tupped and when it came to scanning all but one ewe was in lamb. The empty ewe had been tupped, but not every ewe will hold to the first tupping and in this case there had been a conception that failed after 10 days and then it takes a while for the ewe to come into season again. Typically a shepherd expects 1 to 5% of ewes to be empty. I could have left her with the ram for longer but having one laggard ewe lambing 6 weeks after everything else is a real hassle. Our predicted lambing percentage is 161%. It includes one set of quads and two sets of triplets. The first batch of 22 ewes is due to lamb from the 20<sup>th</sup> Feb. The challenge will be to keep these and everything else alive.



The mild dry winter - until the last few weeks - has meant that we were able to keep the ewes outside for a lot longer than last year. This has saved on winter feed. A farming friend at Southoe also offered free grazing on 15 acres of ancient pasture which has proved ideal for last years ewe lambs. We eventually brought all the flock in on 31st December as with extra winter feeding they were starting to poach the ground. Indoors, I have a lot more control over their rations and getting the nutrition right in the weeks before lambing is critical. Now the ewes, especially those with twins, are looking very fat and do a lot of huffing and puffing as they move around; one ewe, who looks ready to explode and sounds like steam train, wisely sits by the trough so she just has to twist her head to nibble some hay.

Since the above was written, lambs have started to arrive as you can see in these photos! Ed
