

View from the Pew

As summer recedes and signs of the mists and mellow fruitfulness of autumn appear, thoughts turn to our Harvest Festival on 6th October.



The 're-wilding' project in the churchyard is going well thanks to all our helpers, including those from 'Making the Change Happen' group. The area to be sown with wildflowers has been closely mown with all mowings removed. The ground will be scarified and seeds sown in mid-October. We are very pleased and grateful that Andy has agreed to help Gordon with the ride-on mower (a job shared is a job halved) keeping the rest of the churchyard neat and tidy.

Our future services are listed above.

Hazel's Recipe of the Month Roasted Tomato Sauce

(The recipe is for a large quantity but can be easily adjusted for however many tomatoes you have available, just reduce the amount of garlic)

5 lbs tomatoes (or whatever you have available)

3-4 garlic cloves, sliced

Sea salt

A sprinkling of caster sugar

Olive oil

Cut the tomatoes in half and lay cut side up in a deep roasting pan. Sprinkle with the garlic, salt and sugar then drizzle with olive oil. Roast in pre-heated oven (190°C) for about 40 minutes until the tomatoes are soft and juicy and a little shrivelled.

To make the sauce, scrape off every little bit out of the pan and whizz in your food processor or blender. It will keep in the fridge for a few days but freezes well in batches and is ideal with pasta on its own or to accompany chargrilled courgettes or mushrooms.

NB: If you have left over green tomatoes from the garden these can be easily ripened by placing them in a tray with an apple or banana and keeping them in a dark place (in a drawer or under the sofa?) Check every few days, removing the ripened ones as and when.

PARISH NEWS September 2019

We had a busy meeting following the August summer break, so, it was back to business with a vengeance.

There were several attendees who wanted to discuss a variety of issues including the HGV nuisance at Van Diemens Way, the planning application at 36 Breach Road and works currently underway along the Brampton Lane at the historic archaeological site. The Council agreed to take up the matter of insufficient signage to alert HGV drivers (who shouldn't be on our road anyway) to the low bridge along the Brampton Lane, the fact that Van Diemens is a cul-de-sac and, most importantly, the weight limit through the village.

The works on the archaeological site that were discussed some time ago have begun. The work will safeguard the site from the dangers of falling trees that could destroy the site. The work is being carried out by Historic England in conjunction with Natural England and the management plan set up for the farmer.

The matter of keeping the hedges along Brampton Road under control is a matter for the landowners to address. However, the Parish Council will take this up with our local Highways Officer who has the power to involve an enforcement officer. The overgrown verges along Church Hill will similarly be taken up with the Highways Officer, but the matter of ownership has yet to be established.

The Public Meeting held on 6th September was well attended by residents of both Ellington and Grafham and at least 25 people have expressed an interest in taking an active part in the Neighbourhood Plan pro-

cess. If you missed it and want to know more, please make contact with the Parish Council

The Parish Council has been chasing funds to provide energy saving equipment for the benefit of the Village Hall, the Community



Shop and the Grafham Trout. These include double glazing, solar panels, loft insulation and LED lighting. We were turned down for these initiatives by the A14 Community fund and UK Power Networks. A third attempt is now being made by applying to the Amey Community Fund. Details of all the costs involved will be available for you to look at when the minutes of this meeting are published on the village website.

Please take a look at the contact details below for all of your councillors – email addresses have changed and now specific to the Parish Council and not personal accounts.

With respect to the idea of providing electric car charging points in the village, UK Power Networks have assessed the 3-phase power supply capability and believe it is suitable. Positive feedback has been received informally regarding service providers paying for 25% of the installation costs. When more formal information becomes available it will be discussed further.

The next meeting of the Council will be on 8th October at the village hall. Perhaps we will see you there.







Spring Wildflowers and Unusual Bees

I am busy preparing my bees for winter so you may think my subject this month is premature. My thoughts have turned to a trip to a place where spring has begun.

We are off to Western Australia to see family and to make a road trip around southern Western Australia to experience the famous spring wildflowers. Western Australia is known as The Wildflower State.

The Flora of Western Australia comprises 10,162 published native vascular plant species, along with a further 1,196 species currently recognised but unpublished. They occur within 1,543 genera from 211 families; there are also 1,276 naturalised alien or invasive plant species (Wikipedia).

Around 60% of these 12000+ plant species are only found in Western Australia.

The diversity of flowering plants is paralleled by the diversity of bees. A few facts sourced from an Information Sheet on Native Bees, produced by Western Australia Museum:

- Australia has an estimated 2000 species of native bees, many yet to be scientifically named and described. New discoveries are not uncommon. Approximately 800 species occur in Western Australia.
- Australian bees are diverse in size, form, colouration, degree of sociality and behaviour. Lengths range from 2.5 mm to 25mm. Body form varies from broad and rotund to slender and delicate.
- Australia's bees are predominantly solitary, each female building one or more nests to rear her offspring without the aid of 'workers'. Many burrow in the ground and a few bore in dead, rotting wood or pithy stems. Others use holes in dead wood, hollow stems and abandoned burrows of other bees and wasps.

- Australian bees occupy most terrestrial habitats including the arid inland, if there are flowers. In southern Australia, activity peaks in spring and summer. Most species are active throughout the day, but some fly in the cooler mornings and evenings and a few tropical species fly only at night.
- Some are generalists while others display varying degrees of specialization. They may confine their foraging to flowers of one family, or even a single species of plant. This determines their geographic ranges and flight seasons.
- At least fifty species of bees inhabit the bushlands around Perth and several occur quite commonly in suburban gardens and city parks.
- Western Australia's tiny 'stingless bees' or 'sugarbag bees' are found in the tropical north living in colonies of hundreds of individuals in 'hives' in tree or rock hollows. Like the honeybee, each colony has a single egg laying queen and many female workers that co-operate to build the nest, forage for food and other raw materials and tend the brood. The hives are built of a mixture of secreted wax and plant resin. Stingless bee hives have traditionally been sought by aboriginal people for their stores of honey.

(It seems that in Australia there are enthusiasts who 'keep' native stingless bees as pets, pollinators or small scale honey producers. I believe this practice has its roots in aboriginal culture).

The honeybee was introduced to Australia by the European settlers to pollinate fruit trees and provide honey and beeswax. Honeybees have become feral throughout Western Australia wherever they have access to water. The majority of native bees are capable of stinging, but do so only under duress.

Some ideas for saving water

from Make the Change in Grafham

- 1. Collect runoff from hot water taps and showers, use to:
 - flush loo,
 - · rinse dishes to remove washing up liquid,
 - · water plants.
- 2. Collect condensed water from the tumble dryer to:
 - · water plants,
 - use in steam iron.
- 3. You can find water retaining crystals which are mixed into the bedding soil for plants in pots.
- 4. Get a Hippo to put in your toilet cistern to displace water, so you don't use so much of it when you flush. These used to be available free from some water companies but if not, a house brick has the same effect.

Stoats and Weasels

Stoats and weasels are our most common mammalian predator with a population of approx. 430,000 individuals for each species. Foxes only number around 258,000 individuals. Stoats and weasels are members of the Mustelid family, linking them with badgers, otters and if you venture abroad wolverines and skunks.

Whilst being initially similar in appearance there are certain points that distinguish the two species. Stoats are much larger than weasels, being, on average, some 10cm longer and 200g heavier. The tails are different as well. Weasel tails are rarely more than 5cm long, whereas stoats have tails up to 14cm long and they always have a black tip. In the colder reaches of their range, stoats may also change colour in winter becoming either partially or completely white, but always retaining the black tip to the tail.



Whilst in this colour change, known as being 'in ermine', stoats were prized for their fur and it was used for centuries to decorate royal and ceremonial robes. Despite this and the fact that both species are controlled as pests, populations continue to flourish.

The habitat requirements are similar for both species. As long as there is reasonable cover and adequate prey and places to make dens, they will thrive beside one another. This is mainly because of the different prey species taken. Weasels prey on small mammals such as voles and mice, for which they have a prodigious appetite, consuming half their body weight each day. They are capable of following voles and mice anywhere, as a weasel's head is the widest part of its body so if the head fits through the rest will follow.

Stoats on the other hand like much larger meals, with a marked preference for catching rabbits, quite a feat considering the average rabbit weighs six times more than a stoat. And whilst stoats will go down burrows after rabbits they are more than capable of running them down in an open chase, leaping onto the back of the exhausted rabbit to kill it with a bite to the back of the neck. The tales of stoats hypnotising rabbits by 'dancing' may be apocryphal, but they are affected by a parasitic nematode



Skjabingylus nasicola which infect the nasal passage and, it is thought, cause distortion of the sinuses, which it turn causes pressure on the brain. This may produce unusual changes to behaviour patterns causing the manic activity known as dancing.



Although flighty and elusive animals, they are also incredibly inquisitive, and this can be used to your advantage should you ever come across one. If you know one is in your immediate vicinity, keep very still and make gentle squeaking noises through pursed lips. The Stoat or Weasel, thinking the noise comes from a possible meal, will come forward to investigate. Using this method I have managed to coax a weasel to within six feet of my location.










- The other way to take part is to let me know if, when and where you have seen hedgehogs this summer.

Harvest Festival

As we prepare to leave the summer behind us, the first of a run of 'festivals' ahead of us is the Harvest Festival. Harvest is from the Anglo-Saxon word hærfest, 'Autumn.' It then came to refer to the season for reaping and gathering grain and other grown products. The full moon nearest the autumnal equinox is called the Harvest Moon and so, in ancient traditions, Harvest Festivals were held on or near the Sunday of the Harvest Moon. This moon is the full moon which falls in the month of September.


The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as 'We plough the fields and scatter,' 'Come ye thankful people, come' and 'All things bright and beautiful' but also Dutch and German harvest hymns in translation, helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.

For many of us though, the harvest is something that we are far removed from. We have lost touch with the idea that a week of rain during the summer might have any impact on the food in our supermarkets or the supply of grain for making flour or cereal. This can make Harvest

Festivals seem irrelevant but the truth is we are as dependent upon good harvests, in this country and elsewhere, as we ever were and we have much to be thankful for.

As we reflect on God's provision for us

— for food on our tables and in our



Almighty and gracious Father, we give you thanks for the fruits of the earth in their season and for the labours of those who harvest them. Make us, we pray, faithful stewards of your great bounty, for the provision of our necessities and the relief of all who are in need, to the glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

New Huntingdonshire Cycling and Walking Campaign Group forms

Do you care about issue such as air quality, safe cycling routes, traffic congestion and safer routes to school?

At the moment, Huntingdonshire lags behind neighbouring districts of East and South Cambridgeshire in terms of cycling levels and has less than a third of the percentage of people that cycle once a week compared with Cambridge. 16% in Huntingdonshire compared to 58% in Cambridge.

Huntingdonshire Cycling & Walking Campaign Group would like that to change.

Founder John Morris from Brampton says the group will be formally launched in Autumn 2019 to try and improve conditions for people who cycle and walk in the towns of Huntingdon, Godmanchester, St Neots, St Ives, Ramsey and surrounding villages.






